Our students form lasting partnerships with faculty and our professors are committed to student development. The faculty is dedicated to the well being of students based on caring and compassion.

## Experience Your Learning

Master of Social Work students have opportunities to work with local communities and agencies through a highly individualized field experience program. Students find this helpful in building skills and knowledge and obtaining jobs following graduation.

The Master of Social Work Community Project is a sustainable, practice-based opportunity for student leadership, creativity, self-direction, professional mentorship and community engagement.

All social work students complete required community placements under the supervision of skilled practitioners, and are given feedback on their practice skills in order to be effectively prepared for work in the field. Placements include school social work, community services, child welfare, health care and tribal social services settings.

Many students state that their field experience and their relationship with their internship supervisor was a critical factor in their professional development.

- Our department supports progressive practice that is based on peace, justice, experimentation, risk-taking, inclusiveness, partnership, non-expert paradigms of relationships, and a belief in the uniqueness of each student's own professional goals and vision of becoming the social worker they want to be.

## Social Work, M.S.W.

The Master of Social Work program teaches students how to achieve a disciplined, compassionate presence to a caring and ethical practice, with a focus on working in rural and Indigenous communities.

The program's emphasis is on working with Indigenous and rural communities and coursework designed to decolonize mainstream social work practice. Students develop a framework for practice guided by personal and professional values and ethics.

Cultural humility, compassion, partnership, empowerment, non-expert relational paradigms, critical reflection, and social action for justice are the concepts that form the foundation for learning and developing social work practice at Cal Poly Humboldt.

The program prepares students for advanced generalist practice which emphasizes multi-system, multi-level approaches in which practitioners and clients work in collaboration to enhance the functioning and resilience within systems through building on existing strengths.
