Community Need Statement

All individuals deserve access to quality end-of-life care. Access to palliative care is considered a human right, but fewer than 1 in 8 people who need palliative care have access to it and lack of access to palliative care increases suffering for patients and families, as well as increasing the burden of healthcare costs.

Humboldt County currently has a small number of formal palliative & hospice care organizations, however, whether or not these providers deliver culturally-relevant palliative & hospice care for Indigenous clients has yet to be determined.

The purpose of our community project is to explore and assess whether any formalized local Indigenous palliative and hospice care services and resources exist in Humboldt County. Research was conducted to gauge the availability and accessibility of culturally-relevant end-of-life care services.
